Thank you to those parents who have been working with us at the school to help keep our students safe!

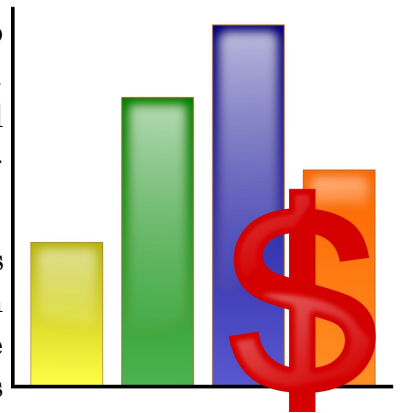
Thank you to the many parents who honour the posted parking signs, are mindful of the speed zone in front of the school, and park away from the crosswalks. Again, our students' safety is top priority to us at Westboro, and our school zone is a very busy place before and after school. We have included a map from Strathcona County that outlines parking around the school in this edition.

Once again, please remember to respect the posted signs, and laws for parking around our school!

## BUDGETS & CLASSES

Over the next few weeks, the school budget will be released to school principals in order to start planning for the next school year. Budgets are based upon numbers of students registered in a school in September and base grant amounts are determined by the provincial Government. These factors can make planning a bit tricky!

Did you know that approximately 96-98% of our school budget pays for the salaries of the staff who work in our school? We are left with small amounts of money with which to provide the other things we need. Technology, furniture, paper supplies, books and other items must be budgeted for from the remaining 2-4%.



To this end, we must try to configure classes within this budget as well. Budget cuts may influence class size, numbers of classes or even the amount of “extras” we can provide for our students. For more information about the budget in Westboro School, please feel free to attend the school council meetings. The preliminary budget will be submitted in April and hopefully be presented at the May Council Meeting. The final budget is submitted in October and will be presented at the Council Meeting in November.

Additional information about class configurations will be shared in the newsletter in May or June.

Determining accurate enrolment for the 2017-2018 school year is essential because enrolment impacts the school budget and our staffing process. Parents, please help us by advising the school office if you are moving out of the Westboro attendance area or by advising new neighbours within the Westboro attendance area to register at our school as soon as possible. Your help means that we will have accurate information as we work through the budget and staffing process. Thank you.

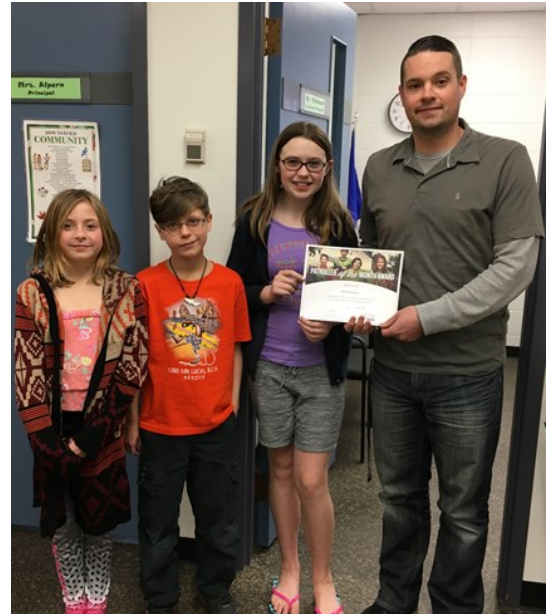

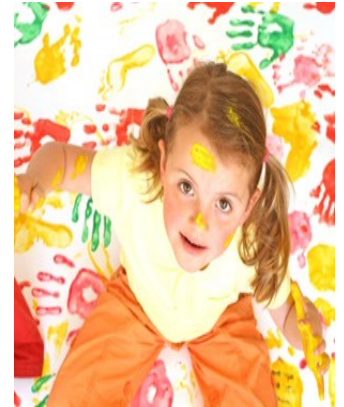
## REGISTER FOR KINDERGARTEN

To register, bring your completed [Student Registration Form](#) to the school you're enrolling your child at along with proof of your child's name, residence, date of birth and citizenship. If you're registering for kindergarten at SouthPointe School, the new school in Fort Saskatchewan opening in the 2017–2018 school year, you can submit a registration form to any elementary school in Fort Saskatchewan - the school will make sure your registration package is delivered to the principal at SouthPointe School.

## EIPS DISTRICT NEWS

### NEW SCHOOL IN SHERWOOD PARK

#### Let's Talk About: School Boundaries and Name

Planning is almost complete on establishing the attendance boundaries for the new K-6 school in the Davidson Creek area. The new boundaries will affect both elementary schools and junior high schools in the northeast quadrant of Sherwood Park.

Based on feedback from parents, students, staff and the community, EIPS has revised its proposed school boundaries for the area. Now, it wants to share those recommendations with you. EIPS is holding two information sessions where community members will have the opportunity to view the attendance areas being purposed, ask questions, share comments and speak with the representatives from Elk Island Public Schools.

Also, the naming process for the new school starts on April 10! And, EIPS wants your help. Submissions can be made by visiting [www.eips.ca](http://www.eips.ca) from April 10-30.

## EMERGENCY DRILLS

Over the course of the school year, we are required to run a minimum of eight different drills in order to prepare our students and staff in the case of an emergency. While we have already practiced three emergency evacuation drills, we still have three additional drills like this to complete. (We have been waiting for warmer weather!) In addition, during the month of May we will also be practicing our Lockdown, Hold and Secure and Shelter In Place Drills. (Please see the school calendar on our website for specific times and dates.)

## KEEPING SAFE

THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, SCHOOLS CONDUCT TRAINING AND DRILLS to help better prepare students and staff for possible emergency situations. When a school is confronted with an emergency, staff will assess the situation and then decide on a course of action. Schools conduct drills throughout the year to rehearse emergency procedures. These exercises prepare students and staff to act quickly and help to minimize a child's fear during a real emergency. In addition to the procedures described below, schools also practice protocols such as "Drop-Cover-Hold," a method of protecting vital body parts during some natural disasters, and conduct fire drills. All staff and students are required to participate in these drills.

### **Lock-Down**

Lock-Downs are usually used in response to acts or threats of violence to students and/or staff directly impacting the school. During a Lock-Down all doors to and within the school are locked. No one is permitted in or out of any area once it has been locked. Students and staff must respond very quickly to a Lock-Down command to get to a safe location before doors are locked. No one, other than law enforcement, is permitted access to the building until the Lock-Down is over.

### **Hold and Secure**

Hold and Secure is used in response to security threats or criminal activity outside the school. During a Hold and Secure, all entrance doors to the school are locked, with no one permitted in or out of the building. No one, other than law enforcement, is permitted access to the building until the Hold and Secure has been cleared.

### **Shelter-in Place**

Generally, Shelter-in-Place is used during an environmental emergency, such as severe storms or chemical spills. During a Shelter-in-Place, students and staff retreat to safe zones to seek shelter. This includes having students or staff who are outdoors come back into the school. Each school's emergency response plan identifies the safest location for its occupants and how to seal a room from hazardous conditions. Students will not be released or dismissed until the situation has been resolved.

### **Evacuation**

An Evacuation requires all students and staff to leave the school and go to an alternate location. This may mean only going outside and away from the building until it is safe to re-enter the school. In other cases, students and staff may need to go to an evacuation center. Parents will be informed of the alternate location through the school's Crisis Notification Network.

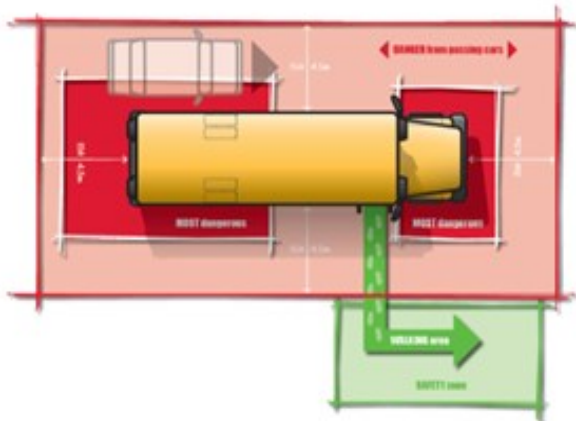
## BOUNDARY EXEMPTION REQUEST PROCESS CLOSES APRIL 7

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) students — in kindergarten to Grade 12 — wanting to attend a non-designated school in the 2017–2018 school year must apply to do so before April 7, 2017. To apply, families must fill out a Boundary Exemption Request Form and submit it directly to their requested school. Any boundary exemption requests received after April 7, 2017 will be declined. There is no late or secondary process.

Final decisions will be made by April 12, 2017.

## BUS SAFETY TIP: STAY CLEAR FOR THE DANGER ZONE!



Did you know there's an area around each bus called the Danger Zone? There is. It's the area around the bus—4.5 meters on all sides—where students, people, or objects are not easily seen by a bus operator. It's important all students stay outside this area at all times. An easy way to tell if you're outside the Danger Zone is to simply take five giant steps—as big as you can make them—back from the road. Staying this far away from the road, before boarding and when getting off the bus, helps keep everyone safe. — EIPS Student Transportation

## PARENT SURVEY

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) is committed to ensuring all parents and guardians of students within the Division have a chance to share their thoughts on the overall performance of their school and the Division. One of the ways EIPS ensures its parent's voices are heard is by conducting an annual parent survey.

In January, the Division invited EIPS families to participate in the 2016–2017 Parent Survey. The survey included 15 questions regarding topics such as the quality of teaching, school leadership, parent engagement and more. The overall response rate was 16 per cent, which included close to 2,700 responses from parents and guardians across the Division.

The feedback gathered will help the Division measure its progress towards meeting the goals and priorities outlined in the EIPS 2015–2018 Three-Year Education Plan and develop strategies to better serve its students and the wider community.
